The PanHellenic Scholarship Awards recognize students' exceptional academic performance by providing meaningful support to those undergraduates with significant financial need, and to those outstanding students whose achievements merit acknowledgement. Our symbol, Nike of Paionios, represents our efforts to see Greek American youth triumph in life through scholarship, hard work, and determination.

WHO WE ARE


The PanHellenic Scholarship Foundation is a national non-profit 501(c)(3) national organization that honors and supports exceptional undergraduate students of Hellenic descent. Chris P. Tomaras established the Foundation in 1998.

Since its inception, the Foundation has awarded significant scholarships to deserving students. In recent years, the total amount of awards given annually has grown to \$250,000. Each year, the Foundation awards twenty \$10,000 scholarships based on academic merit and financial need, and twenty \$2,500 scholarships based solely on academic merit. An independent Academic Committee rigorously reviews hundreds of applications and makes the final selection of Award Recipients.

Including tonight's recipients, the Foundation has honored 408 Greek American college students with scholarships totaling \$2.75 million.

Our Founder

CHRIS P. TOMARAS (1937 – 2015)



Mr. Chris P. Tomaras was the beloved Founder and Chairman of the PanHellenic Scholarship Foundation. He will be remembered as a successful businessman and philanthropist who cared deeply about his family and friends, Hellenism, his Greek Orthodox faith, and education.

Mr. Tomaras was born in 1937 in Greece, and moved to the United States in 1957 to attend school at Columbia University in New York. After facing unforeseen challenges upon his arrival in the U.S.,

Mr. Tomaras was forced to forgo his education and moved to Birmingham, Alabama. In Birmingham, Mr. Tomaras held his first job in the food industry, and opened his first restaurant. Mr. Tomaras also met his wife, Nancy, in Birmingham.


In 1965, the couple moved to Chicago, and Mr. Tomaras opened another restaurant, and invented the Kronomatic Broiler for cooking gyros. His new design, a vertical spit, was patented and soon, Mr. Tomaras established Kronos Foods.

The success of Mr. Tomaras' businesses gave him the means to help others in need. While he was dedicated to many causes and organizations, his passion for education led him to establish the PanHellenic Scholarship Foundation in 1998.

Through the PanHellenic, Mr. Tomaras ensured that no deserving Greek American student would have to give up earning their college education due to lack of financial support. He believed Hellenism and education would build a better America and hoped that the Foundation's scholarship recipients would become meaningful contributors to society.

Chris Tomaras will be remembered as a great philanthropist and an inspiring leader. The PanHellenic Scholarship Foundation will continue to build Mr. Tomaras' dream by emulating his generosity and compassion, and continuing to support exceptional Hellenic scholars who will carry on Mr. Tomaras' legacy by achieving their own dreams and contributing meaningfully to our world. Through the accomplishments of past and present scholarship recipients, Chris Tomaras' dream is coming true and his legacy lives on.



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BETTY CANTRELL

Baciliky Andris, “Betty,” Cantrell is an American beauty pageant titleholder from Warner Robins, Georgia, who was crowned Miss Georgia 2015. On September 13, 2015, she was crowned Miss America 2016.



Cantrell is of Greek and German descent and was named after her Greek grandmother, with the name Baciliky (Βασιλική). She attended Wesleyan College for her freshman year, and then transferred to Mercer University, where she studied vocal performance.

Cantrell entered her first pageant in late 2013. She was one of 38 qualifiers who competed in the 2014 Miss Georgia pageant. She was named second runner-up for the 2014 state title. Cantrell entered the Miss Georgia pageant once again in 2015, and won the competition on June 20, 2015. She earned more than \$15,000 in scholarships from the state pageant. Cantrell also received scholarship awards for winning the talent, evening wear, and on-stage question portions of the competition. As Miss Georgia, her activities included public appearances across the state of Georgia.

Cantrell was Georgia’s representative at the Miss America 2016 competition held in Atlantic City, New Jersey, in September 2015. Her platform was “Healthy Children, Strong America,” a reflection of her childhood spent growing up on a farm in Georgia, and of her parents who are physical therapists. She was crowned Miss America 2016 in September 2015. Along with the title of Miss America, Cantrell also won a \$50,000 scholarship. Cantrell is only the second Miss Georgia to win the Miss America title.

As Miss America, Cantrell served as the official National Goodwill Ambassador for Children’s Miracle Network Hospitals. Additionally, Cantrell appeared as a presenter at several high-profile music award shows.

After passing on her crown at the 2017 Miss America pageant, Cantrell announced that she was engaged to her long-time boyfriend, Spencer Maxwell. The pair recently moved to Nashville, Tennessee for Cantrell to pursue a country music career.



How has your Hellenic heritage influenced your life and contributed to your understanding of the world around you?



SOPHIA REAGAN

I pull forward, my pigtails dancing in the wind while my short legs grind the gravel on the sidewalk underneath them in an attempt to break free. But my Yiayia keeps a tight grip on my small hand with the tips of my fingers turning white with the loss of circulation. “These crazy people will not stop for you Koukla!” she calmly says to me. But my eyes are locked on the koulouri stand across the street while my mouth waters from the smell floating though the air. My mother lags behind as she digs for a few euro to hand to the guy on the corner selling lotto tickets on a towering stick. Papou is already four blocks ahead scouting out a cool bench in the shade.

Simple memories like this one are priceless to me because it has been three years since leukemia has taken my Yiayia. Although I dearly miss her, that tight grip on my hand has not lessened any since she has left us, because she was a major component of the mosaic that makes up my Greek cultural identity, and that still has a comforting hold on me.

Many people have seen the movie *My Big Fat Greek Wedding*, and while some parts (such as the miracle that is *Windex*) are not true to my Hellenic story, most of it is! My father, born in Toledo, Ohio was the first to break the blood lineage in my mother’s family of a Greek marrying another Greek. They met in college, and he was my mother’s first boyfriend. He took steps to impress my mother’s family by attending night classes at the local Greek Orthodox Church to learn the Greek language. My mother, unlike my father, was born

and raised in Athens, Greece. She was brought to America at the young age of 13 to escape the chaotic and dangerous collapse of the military junta. She learned English while taking classes in school, and still struggles with pronouncing some words since the Greek tongue twists in ways that makes certain letters challenging. After a few years, my father won my mother and her family over and they got married in a Greek Orthodox Church. My older sister and I followed seven and eleven years later.

Most every other summer, my family would make the voyage to Greece to visit my mother's side of the family. We usually spend 6 weeks in Greece, going from Parga to Athens to Corfu to Rhodes, in order to cover the family tree that is scattered across Greece. In total, I have spent about 6 months in Greece with family that shower me with food and take me fishing in the Aegean Sea, bussing to monasteries way up in the tranquil mountains, descending into family wine cellars to witness the huge barrels holding gallons of fermenting grapes, and cooking in hot kitchens as I scramble to record family recipes that have been passed down through generations. None of my family is wealthy, but all are rich in culture. The variety of lifestyles that I have been exposed to while visiting them has been quite eye-opening.

My Papou lives in Athens, close to the heart of the city. The hustle and clashing of noises at night comes as a dramatic contrast to the quiet sounds I hear while staying on my great aunt's farm in Corfu. Being able to experience the city and farm life and exploring parts of Greece that some tourists never see is what gives me an authentic, true understanding of the Greek culture and lifestyle that my mother was brought up with, and is what she has passed onto me.

My Greek culture is what drew me to the Greek Studies minor that is offered at the University of Florida (UF). The opportunity to acquire this knowledge means becoming closer with my mother's side of the family and gaining a deeper appreciation for my own cultural identity. I have successfully earned A's in classes like Modern Greek I and II, The Greek Experience, Myths of the Greeks and Romans, and Modern Greek Literature

Since the 1830s. These courses have provided an overview of the timeless achievements of the Greeks, putting special emphasis on the continuity of the Greek civilization. This formal education that I have received adds onto my personal understanding of Greece that I have witnessed on my many visits. I am honored to have completed my minor in Greek Studies at UF.

As a Greek, I must say that I have always been proud of my heritage. No matter the financial situation or the extremist political groups that make the news over seas and back at home, I proudly acknowledge the Greek half within me. The world has altered its view on Greeks in the past few years due to the financial crisis and the upset in the European Union. To many, Greeks are now seen as selfish, unappreciative, lazy people who want their government to hand them everything on a platter with less work involved. While the world may currently hold this viewpoint of Greece, my viewpoint of the Greeks and the world around me has only grown. I have not forgotten the rich history that Greece holds in its marble monuments, or the revolutionary ideas of democracy that has shaped much of our world today. I am always proud to bring up my Greek blood and the successes of the Greeks before me. This common thread that runs through all Greeks in the lifestyle and culture we share is not only comforting to be a part of, but a privilege. Like my Yiayia's grip on my hand, I will always feel the comforting grip of my Greek heritage within me.

Needless to say, I appreciate my American friends too, but it did not take me long to realize how lucky I was to be Greek-American. It didn’t take me long to fully understand why I had such an amazing childhood. My Hellenic heritage was already doing wonders for me and I knew from the very beginning that I would never take that for granted.

My Greek friends definitely helped provide me with a better understanding of the world around me. However, there was more to it than just friendships. Early on, basketball was a very important part of my life. The best part about Greek School on Saturdays was the fact that basketball followed. I began my career on the same court I finished it on. I do not like to talk myself up, but I have always been somewhat talented on the court. In middle school, I was playing on three basketball teams and made church ball a priority. It definitely was not the most competitive, but it was the most fun. I was with girls that I had been playing with for years and I was playing against girls with similar backgrounds. I started playing on the women’s team, which consisted of mostly high school girls, when I was in 5th grade. In the beginning, I did not get much playing time. That was, until Junior Olympics that same year. I played on a co-ed team and I was one of two girls. The coach did not have a choice but to put me in because it was a rule that you needed to have one girl on the court at all times. He was not happy about it, trust me; George Kouriabalis liked to win, however, I surprised that man. I hit some crucial shots and we ended up winning the gold medal that year. When he realized I could play, he became coach for the Saint Demetrios girls team and that was when my playing time shot up. By the time high school rolled around, I was a crucial part of that team and still being younger than most, I did my best to carry the team. I learned leadership skills and helped girls, even older girls, with necessary skills.

My senior year, I was now the oldest but we had a very young team. There were five high schoolers, the rest fell between fifth and seventh grade. JOHN PAPPAJOHN

Mr. John Pappajohn is one of today's most successful leaders in investing, entrepreneurship, and philanthropy. After high school, Mr. Pappajohn worked his way through college, and it took him six years to earn his undergraduate degree in business. He graduated from the University of Iowa in 1952.

After graduation, Mr. Pappajohn became one of the preeminent, national venture capitalists when he founded Equity Dynamics, Inc., a financial consulting entity, and Pappajohn Capital Resources, a venture capital firm in Des Moines, Iowa. Since then, Mr. Pappajohn has been involved in over one hundred start-ups and over fifty IPOs, and has served as a Director in over forty public companies.



Mr. Pappajohn and his wife, Mary, are passionate philanthropists, and are dedicated to supporting education and the arts. Over the years, they have gifted more than \$100 million to various causes, and have been particularly invested in promoting education. The Pappajohns have been integral to the support of business schools, entrepreneurial centers, universities, and scholarship funds across the state of Iowa.
